A regional effort with the goal of planting 250 million trees by 2033.





Why the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Region?

Tree planting is a major opportunity for the region and its people to improve the quality of life while offering a high "return on investment."

Over the next decade, the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Governors & Premiers (GSGP) will work with the region's eight US States and two Canadian Provinces, federal governments, corporations, cities and other institutions to achieve this goal.





Great Lakes Green Events

An initiative that encourages destination stewardship and environmentally beneficial practices for conferences and events in the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Region. Green Events create a positive footprint in local communities.



How to host a Green Event?

- Implement **sustainable practices** at your event.
- Make a financial contribution to the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Trees Initiative to support on-the-ground partners planting trees in local communities.





What are sustainable practices?

Practices that proactively reduce the environmental impact of the event including,

- Reduce paper, food, and single-use plastic waste throughout the event
- Reuse silverware if providing a meal
- Recycle materials and upcycle or donate decorations to other events where possible

Great Lakes Green Events Impact

11 Great Lakes Green Events – 3 more in the next week - planting more than 280 trees.

Over the next 20 years, these trees will:

- Sequester over 11,000 pounds of carbon; equal to driving over 47,000 miles
- Capture over 1.26 million gallons of stormwater
- Remove over 260 pounds of air pollutants (nitrous dioxide, sulfur dioxide, ozone, and particulate matter)



8.5 roundtrips from New York City, NY to Los Angeles, CA



Fill over 43,000 bathtubs



Equal to the weight of 54 iPhones.










DESTINATION DOOR COUNTY

The Door County Destination Stewardship Plan was created to bring together Door County's 19 distinctive communities to create a shared vision and strategic path forward for the future of tourism in the region. This Plan is the outcome of a community-driven process initiated by Destination Door County and guided by a Steering Committee of local community leaders representing a variety of sectors and interests.

This Destination Stewardship Plan comes at a critical time for Door County. Tourism is booming and the community is experiencing challenges related to environmental fragility, workforce infrastructure, housing inventory, childcare, and transportation. Identifying and investing in solutions to these challenges is essential to securing the health and prosperity of Door County, and ensuring that tourism delivers maximum benefits for the community.

Destination planning is about taking a strategic approach to establishing a vision and path forward for the stewardship of Door County. This Plan is intended to serve as a long-term roadmap to guide







Sharing our Region's Story

- The Great Lakes Region has 25% of the world's freshwater.
- The region is so much more than just the Five Great Lakes. The region has more than 100,000 inland lakes, rivers, and streams.
- A Residents and visitors are never more than 10 miles from a body of water.
- ♠ The Great Lakes basin has forests covering 27.8 million hectares, about half of the land in the basin.
- Michigan alone has 14 billion trees.
